THE IMMEDIATE PAST MASTER'S GOBLET

This goblet presented by Past Master Harold Arthur in1984 is one of our Livery's treasured possessions. Past Master Arthur wanted the Goblet specifically inscribed for all Immediate Past Masters to take their wine, which gives it a unique and functional purpose. Originally a Herald's Goblet, only a limited number were issued - the bowl is supported by three heraldic lions rampant holding shields, representing Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II - the Royal Founder Richard III, and the College of Arms itself. The Goblet is made of 9 ozs troy of solid Sterling Silver and stands 6.5" high. The sculptured

stem, interior of the Cup, the border of oaks leaves and Tudor roses at the foot are overlaid with pure gold.

THE WORLD TRADE CENTRE



LAUNCH OF THE BROGDALE APPEAL

"I have had a few words before this ceremony and I can assure your Highness that this tree responds well to conversation". A witty preamble from the Master accompanied the presentation of a quince, Cydonia Elongata, 'Champion', to HRH the Prince of Wales to inaugurate the start of the Brogdale Appeal. Behind this lay many months of careful planning, a profusion of meetings of the Trustees of Brogdale, the formation of a special Appeal Committee, the appointment of a Development Director and some highly useful meetings with Kevin Knott of the Duchy of Cornwall. At the Prince's special



request the venue, St James's Palace and the date, 28th March, had been selected. Invitations had been sent to the movers and shakers of industry, especially those to do with fruit, to important commercial leaders and to the media. The State Apartments at St James's with their glittering chandeliers, burgundy hangings and portraits in carved and gilded frames had been further 'improved' with huge baskets of apples and boughs of plum blossom specially set out by the staff of Brogdale whom the Prince met and talked to at the start of the reception. After an initial hush the room soon began to buzz with conversation as the Prince went from group to group to talk informally with the guests. There was no doubt that Prince Charles has considerable personal interest in Brogdale and is extremely well briefed on how things stand and what needs to be done.



TONY REDSELL AT WORK

An article appeared, last Summer, in 'Style and Travel' which featured Tony Redsell, and his Kent Cherry Orchards. Our photo shows him examining the fruit as they ripen at his farm. Last year was difficult for Tony and many others. Right at the end of June, storms removed all his netting and allowed starlings to strip many of his trees bare. He is hoping for better luck this year. 'British Cherries still have the finest flavour of any in the world', says Tony, 'what we really need is a

Cherry promotion panel that can promote British fruit, raise awareness of its succulence and flavour and of the best ways to cook and present them'. Cherries are amongst our finest fruits. The sweet ones make wonderful desserts and the sour cherry, only rarely used in this country, provides an incomparable flavour in savoury dishes.

The growing conditions in Kent, being cooler than other cherry-growing areas, are ideal. The fruit matures slowly, which is why they




The Livery and Communications Sub-Committee is pleased to report that, with the assistance of the Master, they have persuaded Moss Bros to offer a 20% discount to anyone attending a Fruiterer's function. This discount will be given at every branch of Moss Bros to anyone who shows an official invitation from the Company to a forthcoming event - and applies equally to dinner suits, evening tail coat suits and all accessories - but not to the £2.95 Accidental Damage Waiver. All their usual rules about a deposit being paid, the goods being returned in reasonable condition, overdue returns being charged etc remain.

Moss Bros are considering offering a discount to the other Livery Companies as well and will be receiving a list of the names and addresses of each Company's Clerk from Michael Styles.

It would be helpful to show Moss Bros that this will boost their business and so Members are asked to take advantage of the discount whenever possible - and to make sure that their guests also take up the discount.

It is also hoped that this saving of some £6.10 will help to make the Company's functions even better value and so increase the numbers attending future events.

have that extra flavour, and many of Britain's best varieties ripen ready for market just as the imported cherries are declining. All we need now is some good weather - and good netting to keep the birds away. Tony has been involved in cherry growing since he was a young boy. Trees were taller than - there were many more varieties available, many more orchards, and far fewer birds. Today's orchards are not quite so attractive and are much more mecha-

nised - but you still can't beat the sight of a Kentish Orchard with its trees laden with bunches of rich shiny red luscious fruits.

Other fruit crops grown include apples, pears and blackcurrants. The top fruit is stored and packed on the farm and marketed through ENFRU. Apart from fruit, crops include onions, brassicas, cereals, herbage seed, potatoes and hops, amongst which are the renowned East Kent Goldings.

Tony Redsell was an Honorary Assistant to the Court in 1992/3 until May 1994. He is an active member of the Livery and Communication Sub-Committee - and has recently taken on the task of keeping the records of those Liverymen who attend functions and those who do not! He is also a Trustee of East Malling Research Station and takes a keen interest in all of their, the industry's and the Company's activities.

Tony is married with two daughters, both married, two grandsons and one granddaughter, is an enthusiastic vegetable gardener and a Rugby Union referee. He has also successfully completed thirty London to Brighton Veteran Car runs in his 1904 Wolseley which he states is largely as a result of having a very able co-driver/mechanic.

QUARTER/MEMBERSHIP DATABASE

The Clerk is currently installing a computer database which will combine records of quarterage due and paid. In

1994 there were substantial arrears of quarterage, many arising through Liverymen not paying the correct amount. This has resulted in an unacceptable temporary deficit on the operating account.

All Liverymen are again asked too check that they have paid the correct amount. Bankers order forms are available from the Clerk's office.

Liverymen under 65 are required to pay £146.88 p.a. Liverymen over 65 are exempt provided they have paid for ten years since admission.

REVISED CHARITIES STRUCTURE

As from St Paul's Day 1995, the Fruit Culture Fund, the Ridley Medal Fund and the Lewis Award Fund have been merged with the Fruit Culture Trust.

The Charitable Trust, which has wider power for charity support, remains as a separate fund.

Liverymen are again reminded that legacies to the Company's charities are 'inheritance tax exempt' and are encouraged. Have you remembered the Company in your will?

IN MEMORIAM

Past Master Leslie Turnbull died in December 1994 after a long illness. Leslie was Master in 1963 and was a practicing Chartered Accountant for many years with an office in the City.

Ralph Felton died in April 1995 while on holiday in Spain. Ralph joined the Livery in 1957 and was a wonderful supporter of the Company's aims and ideals and attended many functions. His family firm of Florists was well known in the City and still operates from a number of locations. He was a Honorary Assistant and the first President of the Fruiterers Golfing Society.

ROBERT SICE

Past Master Robert Sice died suddenly on 11 February while on holiday with his wife in Jersey. Robert became a Liveryman in 1960 and was a most active member of the Company. 
