FRUITERERS AWARD COUNCIL

The Master and other members have felt it important to have wider representation on the Awards Council. They are pleased that the following Fruiterers, Graham Broomhall, Jonathan Choat, Laurence Olins, Tony Redsell and Peter Boardman have agreed to join the Council as well as Dr. Jim Flegg (Fruiterer and Head of Station, Horticulture Research International, East Malling) and Roger Worraker (Honorary Freeman). Past Master Alan Todd was elected Chairman of the Awards Council.

Horticulture Research International, East Malling, known to most by its former name East Malling Research Station, was host to the Awards Council for their June meeting. After business was completed the Council enjoyed visits to the glasshouses, laboratories, and the strawberry breeding plot for talks and discussions with research staff on aspects connected with short term students funded by the Fruiterers.

The Council provided a travel grant to Dr. I. Ponamarenko of the celebrated Vavilov Institute, St Petersburg, to visit Brogdale Horticultural Trust, Oxford University Botany School and Wye College to facilitate discussions on the future of the apple gene banks in the former Soviet Union.

Three Student Awards were recommended in 1994: Amanda Hull, Perhsore, Russell Duggan, Writtle and Robert Child, Wye. The Master was invited to the Prizegiving Ceremony at Pershore College in November to present the Fruiterers' Award to Amanda Hull.



SIR ROWLAND WHITEHEAD 'LOOKING FORWARD' TO A GREAT YEAR

Born in Nairobi Kenya Colony, Rowland Whitehead was nurtured on mangoes and paw-paws rather than the standard Cox and Conference that fledgling Fruiterers are weaned upon. This changed for the better on his return to England to a garden with Victorian style orchard and huge variety of apples and pears. Indeed his appreciation of the wonderful range and taste of the English apple started early.

Equally early came knowledge of the Fruiterers Company with his father returning from dinners with a 'souvenir' silver spoon or ashtray engraved with the Fruiterers crest. Were these trophies given out to the quests? He still has six spoons and an ashtray and would like to know how such expensive items came about. Fruiterer father, uncle, grandfather, great-uncle and, not least, greatgrandfather have stamped the Whitehead name for a hundred years or more and Rowland is very proud of this.

He attended Radley College and, after a spell in the Royal Artillery driving tracked vehicles at speed down Welsh country lanes, he went to Trinity Hall Cambridge to read Zoology, Botany and Geology. The important event of his stay at Cambridge was his meeting with his future wife, Isa, and his decision to complete his degree studies at the end of two years and concentrate his final year into learning her language, Norwegian, to the extent that all love-letters were read out to the family over the breakfast table and corrected for grammar, syntax and spelling....

Leaving University he joined Gillette Industries and spent the early days selling razor blades to canny Glaswegians before graduating to promotion and advertising. A spell in an advertising agency taught him the rudiments of this mysterious business though he admits that a taste and knowledge of fine claret seemed to go with it.

A change of direction took him to N M Rothschild and Sons where he enjoyed the merger and acquisition trail for some years mixing with some of the sharpest brains in the City. Banking occupied his working life and he later moved to Brown Shipley and finally to the Dutch bank ABN-AMRO.

He is Chairman of the Rowland Hill Fund - a Post Office charity set up by his greatgrandfather - and looks after the needs of the 200,000 'Posties' and 170,000 retired Post Office workers. 1995 is the 200th anniversary of the birth of Rowland Hill of Penny Postage frame

and Rowland has successfully lobbied the Royal Mail into producing a special stamp to mark the occasion.

Another charity, the Baronets Trust, was founded by Rowland to encourage fellow baronets to give money to their own special charity for sick children. Many hospitals have received help, particularly with the building of rooms for parents of sick children to stay in at the hospital.

He is a Governor of Applby Grammar School where there is a 'Whitehead science Prize' originating from his greatgrandfather, a former pupil, who thought that there was 'not enough science' being taught 100 years ago. Sometimes Rowland wonders if there isn't too much today though he has played his part in giving a 'Whitehead Computing Prize' and seen the school win numerous awards for computer skills.

Today much of his time is taken up with work in Romania where the training of embryo entrepreneurs is badly needed to put the country on
